Host City: San Francisco

The City by the Bay

Globally recognised as a centre of high technology and finance, San Francisco also boasts world-class cuisine, diverse cultural offerings, a well-deserved eco-friendly reputation, an agreeable climate and incomparable geographic setting, all of which make the vibrant 'City by the Bay' a most desirable place to live and an unparalleled destination for visitors.

Perched atop hills and filled-in marshland at the entrance to one of the Pacific's largest natural harbours, San Francisco has had an outsized influence on the history of California and the United States. Originally a Spanish (later Mexican) mission and pueblo, it was conquered by the United States in 1846 and by an invading army of prospectors following the 1848 discovery of gold in its hinterland. The Gold Rush made San Francisco a cosmopolitan metropolis with a frontier edge. The great 1906 earthquake and fire destroyed much of the city but barely slowed its momentum; San Francisco barrelled through the 20th century as a centre of wealth, military power, progressive culture and high technology.

Innovation and Technology

For more than 60 years Silicon Valley's economy has been at the forefront of various breakthrough technologies that have reshaped existing industries and invented new ones. Throughout the history of the region, the leading technologies or innovations have varied considerably from defence to integrated circuits to personal computers to the Internet. We are in the fifth wave of innovation in Silicon Valley, with significant growth since 2005 being led by social media as well as apps, medical devices, mobile technologies and clean technologies. Undisputedly, the Bay Area remains the technology epicentre.

Environment and Nature

Conservation efforts since the 19th century have protected nearly a third of the San Francisco Bay Area lands. In total, over a million acres have been designated as open space, ranging from small city parks to sprawling nature preserves. The city has a focus on green or environmentally minded development, and the community in San Francisco strives to protect and preserve the area's natural resources.

Architecture

The architecture of San Francisco is not known for defining a particular architectural style. The city offers an eclectic mix of Beaux-Arts, Neoclassical, Modern and Victorian architecture.

Famous Bridges

The Golden Gate Bridge is possibly the most beautiful and certainly the most photographed bridge in the world. It opened in 1937 and is one of the longest suspension bridges in the world, at 4,200 feet (1,300 metres).

The Bay Bridge, dating from 1936, is 4.4 miles (7 km) long and connects San Francisco to the East Bay. The bridge features an iconic light sculpture by world-renowned artist Leo Villareal, which shines from dusk to dawn.

Counterculture

San Francisco has maintained a reputation as a centre of cultural bohemianism. In earlier years, it drew writers from Mark Twain to Jack London. Later it became a centre for the 1950s Beat poets and for the Haight-Ashbury hippie counterculture that peaked with the 1967 'Summer of Love'. San Francisco has long been a hotbed of environmental, labour, women's and gay rights activism. In the 1980s the city worked to respond to the challenges of chronic homelessness and the AIDS epidemic.

Accommodation and Meeting Venue

The Ritz-Carlton, San Francisco 600 Stockton St San Francisco, CA 94108

Set within a San Francisco landmark in the scenic neighbourhood of Nob Hill, The Ritz-Carlton, San Francisco, provides convenient access to the best of the 'City by the Bay' with the historic cable car right outside its doors. The city's only AAA Five Diamond hotel, The Ritz-Carlton, San Francisco has a celebrated past. Metropolitan Life commissioned the building after the great 1906 earthquake and fire had entirely destroyed the company's offices and records. Heralded as a 'temple of commerce' when it opened in September 1909, the massive, 17-column building spanning Stockton Street between California and Pine Streets has been expanded five times and is now one of San Francisco's best examples of Neoclassical architecture. During the 1909 opening day ceremonies, a torch-like lamp was placed prominently over the doors to symbolise the insurer's 'watchful service to policyholders' under the shadow of 'the light that never fails'.

The building was named a San Francisco city landmark in 1984 and placed on the list of Architecturally Significant Structures. After extensive renovation, The Ritz-Carlton, San Francisco, opened in 1991, restoring this landmark to its original magnificence.

The de Young Museum was founded in 1894, but closed due to structural damage from the 1989 earthquake. San Francisco philanthropist Dede Wilsey led the charge to raise \$190 million in private donations to reopen the beloved museum. The daring three-story building was created by Swiss architects Jacques Herzog and Pierre de Meuron, designers of London's Tate Gallery of Modern Art. A total of 950,000 pounds of copper sheathes the exterior, which has faded to a rich green that blends in with the surrounding trees. The museum tower provides a stellar view of verdant Golden Gate Park, the largest cultivated urban park in the United States.

The gala reception will be held in the Hamon Observation Tower, a spectacular glass-walled space with a 360-degree panoramic view of downtown San Francisco, Golden Gate Park, the Bay, and the Marin Headlands. During the reception, guests may view the museum's art galleries on a docent-led tour.

Guests will have the unique experience of enjoying a dinner prepared by the esteemed Bay Area native Alice Waters. Alice is a chef, author, food activist and the founder and owner of Chez Panisse Restaurant in Berkeley, California. In 1995 Alice founded the Edible Schoolyard Project, which advocates for a free school lunch for all children and a sustainable food curriculum in every public school. She has been Vice President of Slow Food International since 2002. In 2015, she was awarded the National Humanities Medal by President Barack Obama, proving that eating is a political act and that the table is a powerful means to social justice and positive change.

Upon the conclusion of dinner the Alonzo King LINES Ballet will offer a private performance. LINES Ballet is a celebrated contemporary ballet company that has been guided since 1982 by the unique artistic vision of Alonzo King. Collaborating with noted composers, musicians and visual artists from around the world, Alonzo King creates works that draw on a diverse set of deeply rooted cultural traditions, imbuing classical ballet with new expressive potential and connecting audiences to a profound sense of shared humanity.

Guests will see the most renowned sites of San Francisco from the comfort of a luxury vehicle with a charming tour guide. They will also have the unique opportunity to visit the Traina Collection, led by Trevor Traina in his stunning Pacific Heights home. The Traina Collection of photography traces the evolution of the field from the 'new documentarians' of the 60s and 70s through current large-scale colour photography. From Robert Frank and Diane Arbus to Andreas Gursky and Jeff Wall, the Traina is one of the largest private collections in the country and many pieces have been lent to U.S. and international shows.

Following the tour, luncheon will be served at one of San Francisco's most highly regarded restaurants, Octavia. Chef Melissa Perello's daily evolving selections spotlight her commitment to sustainability and the Bay Area's wealth of agricultural resources. After luncheon guests have the option of walking along the rocky and windswept shoreline at Lands End or returning directly to the hotel. Lands End is a park within the Golden Gate National Recreation Area that contains the popular Coastal Trail, the Cliff House, the Sutro Baths ruins and a hidden labyrinth at Eagle's Point constructed by local artist Eduardo Aguilera.

Octavia is one of San Francisco's most highly regarded restaurants and a neighborhood gem.

Once occupied by the Yelamu Tribe prior to Spanish settlement in 1776, the Gold Rush brought new life to this area. By the 1860s, a horse-drawn stagecoach made the trip every Sunday from crowded downtown San Francisco out to Lands End. During the 1880s, millionaire Adolph Sutro purchased property at Lands End and dramatically transformed the area into a popular seaside destination. Sutro designed and funded the elegant Sutro Heights public gardens, the famous Sutro Baths and the 1896 Cliff House, which replaced the original building after it burned.

Guests will have the opportunity to cross the Golden Gate Bridge into Marin and head to Muir Woods to walk among old-growth coastal redwoods. On 9 January 1908, U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt declared the land a national monument. The monument is named after naturalist John Muir, whose environmental campaigns helped to establish the National Park system. On 19 May 1945 delegates of the United Nations gathered in Muir Woods to hold a memorial for U.S. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in Cathedral Grove, where a dedication plaque was placed in his honour.

Following the hike, luncheon will be served at The Battery Penthouse. The Battery is a beautifully designed 58,000-square-foot private club and The Penthouse encompasses 6,200 square feet of luxury with prominent floor to ceiling windows and exposed steel beams. After luncheon guests have the option of visiting one of two San Francisco treasures, the SFMOMA for a docent-led tour; or a guided visit to the Ferry Building. The SFMOMA holds an internationally recognized collection of modern and contemporary art, and was the first museum on the West Coast devoted solely to 20th-century art. The Ferry Building, which opened in 1898 and served as the transportation focal point for anyone arriving by train, is a vibrant marketplace of local farmers, artisan producers, and independently owned and operated food purveyors.
